# St. Peter's Evangelical Lutheran Church 246th Annual Congregational Meeting

January 30, 2022

Pastor started the meeting with asking Anita to provide the opening prayer at 10:00am. Anita Bailey opened the meeting with a prayer thanking the Lord for his unending grace and the blessings he has bestowed on the "Little Church that does big things." Then Council President, Suzanne Shaffer called the 246th Annual Meeting to order at 10:32 AM via the Zoom platform. Eric Jacobson moved to accept the minutes from the last annual meeting of January 2021 and Joy Jacobson seconded. Approved by majority count (no opposed votes).

**President's Report:** Suzanne gave a heartfelt message to the congregation.

### **Church Statistics for 2021:**

- 7 Baptisms
- 1 Wedding
- 17 New Church Members
- 10 Funerals/Passed
- 6 Confirmands
- 8 First communion

**Budget Review:**-Suzanne Shaffer presented the balanced budget for 2022.

David Kinka, our treasurer, spoke to review the following highlights:

Overall, 2021 ended with a surplus in the General Fund of \$21,615 and a shortfall in the Maintenance Fund. A large capital expense, the long-overdue painting of the steeple, is expected in 2022.

The 2021 General Fund surplus will be utilized as follows:

- \$5000 for a future cushion
- \$4000 to the maintenance fund
- \$8000 to capital reserve
- \$2000 to benevolence
- \$1000 to Manna on Main Street
- \$1000 to Silver Springs

The approval of the budget is an important part of the annual meeting. Your church council and finance committee provided the following highlights and notable changes from last year:

- The 2022 budget is being balanced using \$5,000 of our 2020 surplus.
- The staff is getting 3% raises. In addition, the church secretary's salary reflects the additional 5 hours a week which was begun mid-2021.
- The Family Faith budget has been reduced but has money in the Family Faith Fund to cover planned expenses.
- Pastor's discretionary money is being removed from the budget line but has sufficient funds that have been donated and are available in a non-budget Discretionary Fund.

David Kinka moved to accept the budget as presented. Frank Gillian / Meg Matlack seconded. Approved (no opposed)



### Looking ahead... to 2023

### Completion of the Devotional Book Project

Since the beginning of the pandemic, twenty writers have been working on this project, and this year it will be finished. By June 30, we expect all 365 devotions to be completed. Once the holiday season 2023 comes around the corner, we will offer 500 books with a devotion for every day of the year. This book will be unique because it is not written by experts or spiritual professionals, if you don't count my contributions. It is written from the hearts of people in our congregation. It is written from different viewpoints. It contains different writing styles. It will be a nice gift for family members who are hungry for spiritual food or just for a different take on the Bible (even some griping!!!) I expect that the book will go for \$15 per piece.

### Major Upgrades in our Historic Cemetery

This is also the year when will make significant improvements to our cemetery. This includes a professionally graded walking path from the Prospect Ave entrance to the Columbarium, complete with a paved walkway around the burial site. This will allow people with disabilities easier access. The project includes eight new historic markers that tell the story of people buried there. It includes work on the most dilapidated wall, which has already begun. Night lights and signs have been added for security; several memorial benches and memorial trees will enhance this place. In the first part of the year we will hold a cemetery fundraiser to offset costs and also to promote the sale of available niches in the Columbarium.

### **Stephen Ministry Transition**

Our Stephen Ministry Leaders Rebecca Ledder and Laurie Kane are "retiring" this year. Rebecca will still be available as a Stephen when needed. The new leader is Yvonne Garrity. She is attending an extensive training program and will start working with our Stephen Ministers toward the middle of this year. Stephen Ministry is a caring one-on- one ministry for people who are going through difficult times. Some of our Stephen Ministers were under-utilized during the pandemic and we will be using this transition to offer this ministry anew for the mental and spiritual health of our people.

### **Volunteer Coordination**

One of the areas that need attention is volunteer coordination. During the pandemic many of our mem-

bers took a break and some areas frankly need some help. Examples are the coffee hour that hinges mostly on the dedicated work of Diana Blum or the ongoing challenges of filling worship assistant spots for Sunday morning services, to name just a few. Our council will take on this challenge as one of the priorities for this year.

### A Night with the Mystics

Once upon a time we organized an event to promote the amazing vibrancy and diversity of mystical writings (short poems mostly) in our world. That was in 2020 and was postponed because of the pandemic. A new date hasn't been set yet, but we are planning to have this event in the fall of this year at the Ambler Theater. It will be an opportunity to invite people who are on the fence about religion but are interested in core spiritual questions, practices and writings. We will keep you posted.

### Mission Trip and Global Ministry

Our Global Ministry Team has been dormant since 2020 but not inactive altogether. After all, we have released funds for projects in Puerto Rico, New Creation Lutheran Church in Philadelphia, and in Ukraine. Discernment about a possible Mission Trip in 2023 and projects that we want to support beyond the scope of our community will take place, beginning soon.

And those are only some of the areas that will receive our attention this year. May the Spirit of God lead and guide us!

### **PROPERTY**

As always, special thanks to the entire Thursday Gang for all the big and even routine things they do throughout the year. I also understand that steps are being taken to show our appreciation to Bill Johnson -- who's 24/7 handyman efforts on behalf of the Church are greatly saluted. He has become our "first alert" system!

The biggest Property project this year was the painting of the Steeple (last done 12-15 yrs. ago), along

with and surrounding fret work. At the same time, the large, round window (below the steeple) was painted and the external windows on the 2<sup>nd</sup> floor of the Education Building (facing Church Street). The urinal in the Ed. Bldg. was repaired to stop and prevent future leaks. Also addressed was the 100-year old trap and pipe (beneath the urinal) -- both now replaced with PVC.

Insulation was added to the attic above the Narthex to provide protection against another pipe freeze problem. And just recently, Scott Lauro (one of our Church members) replaced the six concrete walkway blocks that were damaged by the weight of the crane used to paint the Steeple. This cost for that replacement was covered by the painter's insurance plan. And finally, a lot of parts were replaced and/or updated to the heating system to keep the boilers running most efficiently and preventing further loss of heat.

This is an old building! It requires diligent and frequent system follow-ups to protect her from all those mechanical things that can and do wear out.

### SOCIAL MINISTRY

- We continue to collect food which we donate to both Manna on Main St and New Creation Lutheran Church in Philadelphia.
- **Good Gifts** raised \$2167.81. We purchased 3 family farms totaling 3 cows, 6 goats, 36 chicks, 6 pigs, 1 rooster, plus tools, seeds and agricultural training for three families.
- We continued our support of Gemma )Silver Spring and Martin Luther School):
  - **Undy Sunday** collection: new socks and underwear for the children living in the residential program.
  - We also collected over 50 **Christmas** gifts for the children.
  - Pie Days haven't returned yet since Covid but hopefully will resume this year.
- The **Mother's Day Blanket** appeal, **Easter Flowers** and **Christmas Dedication** moneys were collected for various local charities and Ukrainian relief.
- Once again we participated in the North Penn School District Build-A-Bag program where we collected school supplies and backpacks for local students.

- In October, four St Peter's runners laced up their running shoes to support Laurel House (Nehemiah's Way) by participating in the Laurel House 5K Dash Against Domestic Violence. The team raised \$430 through their efforts.
- Caring Chefs cooked about 25 meals this year.
- We worked on three projects on **North Wales Day of Service:** St Peter's cemetery clean up and beautification, work on the New Creation Apartment in Kensington, and work on a parishioner's house who had been hospitalized.
- The Little Free Lending Library is up and serving the community at the corner of East Montgomery and Main Streets.
- We are continuing our partnership with **New Creation Lutheran Church** in Philadelphia. We have been helping them by collecting blankets, sleeping bags, and men's clothing that are delivered to the homeless in their area. We also have an ongoing work project in the parsonage/apartment which helps them raise much needed rental income.
- Family Promise of Montgomery County (Inter Faith Hospitality Network): In June, St. Peter's FINAL-LY served as a host congregation in the Interfaith Hospitality Network. (Our efforts to host families were susupeneded in 2021 due to COVID). In June, we provided emergency shelter and support for 4 families receiving services from Family Promise MontCo PA while they awaited permanent housing solutions. This effort involved over 50 volunteers including folks from Gwynedd Friends Meeting, St. Rose of Lima, Sanctuary Methodist, Congregation Beth Or, Grace Baptist Blue Bell, as well as our own great team from St. Peter's. Thank you!

### WORSHIP AND MUSIC

Dear Friends,

Over the four months of working at St. Peter's in 2022, I got to know the various musical groups, identify individuals with untapped musical talent, and experiment with some of the worship forms familiar to the congregation. The groups at St. Peters include the choir, A Common Thread, the Belles, and an emerging men's group. In September, I immediately got to work with the choir and A Common Thread, two strong pillars in the music ministry. I was heartened to see the choir grow gradually to include youth and men and similarly delighted by the enthusiasm of A Common Thread's members to bring contemporary worship in a traditional setting. Over time, I put together a special music list that included as many of our volunteers as possible. This cemented the gaps where the choir was not leading worship and brought out talented individuals in our midst. By the time Advent rolled around, I implemented a few of my ideas into the worship form including Schubert's Kyrie, improvisation to hymn melodies, and (most importantly) prayer before services with the musicians. Christmas Eve brought out the best of what St. Peter's had to offer including an eighteen member choir; our own brass players; and three unique services bridging family, tradition, and spirituality.

While I hesitate to lay down a grand vision for 2023, I do have three goals in mind: seeking out more musicians in our midst, growing the choir (especially with men), and engaging children in music. Pastor Wagner, Liz Allen, and Kirsten Olson have done a tremendous job building a ministry with great momentum. I believe 2023 will be a year of growth for all of us and I'm excited to be on this journey with you!

### TREASURY REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDING 2022

We would like to extend thanks to the generous support of its members and associates. Behind the actual financial support is the non-financial volunteering provided by members which combined with the financial support builds a strong foundation at St. Peters.

St. Peters ended another successful year of financial support by the congregation. We ended the year with a surplus of \$20,500. Contributing to the surplus was a savings of \$6,515 of not having a fulltime music director for 2022 and \$5,000 surplus from 2021 in balancing the 2022 budget. The balance came from good faith general offerings exceeding expectations.

Outside the general fund in the maintenance account, we absorbed the excess remaining maintenance cost of the Cemetery Ops and Maintenance Fund of \$3,808. (Non-Budget Item) We did move to maintenance \$4,000 of the 2021 surplus which basically absorbed the excess Cemetery Ops. Along with a credit of return of LED lights the maintenance account increased \$911 year over year with ending balance of \$7,097. Note the account was \$15,459 at the beginning of 2021. In 2022 the account absorbed 2 major items. (New entrance door and refrigerator) totaling \$11,740 which was non-budget items for maintenance.

The capital reserve account started the year at \$25,890. The church required a large expenditure of \$23,850 to maintain its steeple. Special appeal brought in contributions of \$17,755. General donations of \$6,980 and \$8,000 from 2021 surplus covered this expenditure and also were able to build up the reserve to \$34,775 which is a more respectable balance for the future.

From Pastor's daily posts you will have seen notes in preparing the 2023 budget by the finance committee and approved by council. We asked the congregation for approval of the 2023 budget.

### St. Peter's Proposed Budget 2023

The 2023 Budget for St. Peter's Lutheran Church has thoughtfully and carefully been prepared by the Finance Committee and will be voted on at the Annual Meeting on Sunday, January 29th

**Budget Notes:** Some of the line items have notable changes from 2022.

#### **Income Notes:**

- The "Family Faith From Campaign" is decreasing by \$2,500. The funds from this campaign have been fully expended. Note that this campaign was many years ago and these funds lasted longer than expected.
- The Miscellaneous Donations line was decreased by approximately \$3,000 to be conservative since much of this is unexpected donations.

#### **Expense Notes:**

- All staff will receive a 4% salary increase. Note, the Director of Music's salary has been prorated based on the 5 months worked in 2022.
- The Secretary/Office Manager position received an additional increase based on updates to the job description and expanded responsibilities.
- The Family Faith line is decreasing by \$3,000 because there is money in a Family Faith Fund to supplement this.
