A MESSAGE FROM PASTOR WAGNER

The season of Lent is a time of prayer and introspection. This reflection first appeared in our daily messages on February 9, but it is a good one to keep in mind throughout Lent when candles and prayers will reign supreme in our services.

Dear church,

Paul writes this at the end of his letter to the people in Thessalonica and it sounds a little bit like a parent giving last pieces of advice to their children before they depart. Paul was in fact the spiritual father of those congregations

“Rejoice always, pray without ceasing.”

1 Thessalonians 5:16-17

that he wrote to and some others as well; in addition, he formed disciples that took on this role when he was gone later. He uses the expression “pray without ceasing” a few times in his letters. And if you wonder how we are supposed to do that (constantly praying???), especially when you lead a busy life with many activities, children perhaps, and a fulltime job, you are not alone. Yes, how are we supposed to take Paul seriously here? Can we make prayer as natural as breathing?

Last week when I was in my old home in Germany, we were joined by my nephew Lukas, his wife Mona and their two young children. It was a re-education in what it means to be a young parent, let me tell you. They never had enough hands, it seemed, and barely a moment to themselves, despite other helping and well-meaning adults nearby. Comforting fact to those who have very young children: after a while you forget just how demanding it was! Yes, you really forget!!! I looked at my wife and we both said that we couldn't do that level of care anymore, with sleep deprived nights and near-constant needs. It's for a younger generation... Paul of course never had biological children. It's easy for him to say, “Pray without ceasing...” The guy had never changed a diaper in his life!

But I also wouldn't say he is wrong or irrelevant here. It's more, I believe, about how we define prayer. If you use a very strict definition of formal traditional

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



prayer, concentrated time for prayerful words, that's not possible all the time except maybe for people who have dedicated their entire life to ministry and prayer. But even those 'saints' would find it challenging, trust me! Let me go back to my original question: "Can we make prayer as easy as breathing?" And I think the key is to be in fact more connected to our body (breathing), and in our mind holding life and people before God. Helpful is a practice that centers you in prayer every day. Then live your life as mindfully as possible. Every breath can in fact be a prayer and you don't always need to know it. Our body does many things every second without us thinking about it. You don't think about breathing or pumping blood through your veins, thank God! The oldest part of our brain takes care of it. It's automatic.

I believe it is possible for people who practice prayer and mindfulness to develop this subconscious constant sense of prayerfulness as they go about their daily chores and work. It is a very advanced practice of spirituality, and I will tell you that I'm not even close to be in that category. But it's nice to have goals, even after all those years of ministry... Eventually, a spiritual person does most things in life in a prayerful way. It's like breathing...

A Tribute to my Father: Ernst Siegfried Wagner

“A thousand years in your sight are like a day that has just gone by, or like a watch in the night.”

Psalm 90: 4

Dear church,

I have so many stories and memories connected to my father, stories of the old times, stories that he told me on visits in recent years, some of them oft repeated. I always soaked them up. He was born in 1935 and experienced the great war from the vantage point of a little kid, watching fighter airplanes and bombers in the air heading for the big cities, young lads going off to fight, some of them never to return. He experienced the poverty of the postwar years, refugees knocking on his childhood home to get help from his father (the mayor) and working 16 hours a day as a young apprentice in the physically demanding butcher trade. The men on my father's side of the family were short and stocky. My dad fit that profile; in his younger years he was strong as a bull. I will admit that I was often scared of him as a child, scared to trigger his short temper, which was partly owed to the circumstances in which he grew up and then: hard work, little money, and a family of six to support. In 1969/1970 he built our family home, did the lion's share of the work himself and finished it in ten months without missing time on his paid job - by then in a steel mill. Some 30 years later the home was paid off. He modelled a strong work ethic for sure.



My parents came from humble farmer and working-class roots; they grew up in tight-knit village communities that gave them a strong sense of belonging, a set of sacred values and also a connection to faith and religion. I came of age in that kind of a place; it has shaped me to this day, no matter where I went from there. Now the death of my father marks the end of that era, the passing of a generation that we looked up to, second-guessed and probably didn't appreciate as much as we should have. Typical kids! When I think about that generation it strikes how many strong and colorful characters were among them and (am I unfair here???) how bland and sanitized the world has become. I tell you, those people who grew up in the post war years had edges and wonderful flaws. They could be cranky and unreasonable and stubborn in a wonderful way – wonderful, if you didn't happen to stand in their way. I don't know whether you understand what I mean, but it's the best way I can explain it...

My bull-headed father (the young version) mellowed significantly as he aged. His softer side was allowed to blossom in later years. By then he was secure enough to occasionally talk about the fears he faced and some of the regrets he had. He was given extra time on earth, an extra 22 or 23 years, a gift that I surely appreciated. On New Year's Day in 2000 or 2001 he had a massive heart attack and was brought back to life by the swift actions of a medical response team. He lived with a bad heart for half of his life. Amazingly, he was able to change his diet and lifestyle after that incident, something that I didn't think he had in him. He surprised us.

It always amazes me how fast life is changing. It seems like these few decades between his and my upbringing are like a thousand years. And it's the same with my own children. The world is changing fast. We can lament it, grieve it, embrace it, all at the same time. But we can't change it. I am happy that I was able to talk to him on Monday, the day before he passed. We had a nice, pleasant conversation. He asked to greet everybody in the family. We said "Tschuess." It was the last word I heard him say. But in the spiritual world, it is not the last word between us. He is now with God. My dad died on January 24, 2023 at the age of 87. Thanks be to God!

We have good news from our friends in Ukraine on several fronts. First, the servicemen from the congregation who are defending their country are still alive and well at this point. We continue to pray for Oleg, Sergey, Igor, Andrey who are fighting for the freedom of Ukraine. Also, Pastor Ihor's congregation was able to purchase a plot of land near Kyiv as a site for a new ministry center. He mentioned two benefactors in particular: Diaconia Evangelical Church of Czech Brethren and St. Peter's Lutheran Church in North Wales. Among other things, Pastor Ihor posted pictures of people making candles to keep warm at night during power outages caused by Russian attacks. The resiliency and toughness of the people there is inspiring! We continue to support them and in fact sent a portion of our 2022 surplus to our friends in Ukraine in addition to the donations already sent in 2022.

UPGRADES AT ST. PETER'S HISTORIC CEMETERY

Dear church members and friends,



As you must know by now, upgrades are coming to St. Peter's Cemetery, located on Main and Prospect Streets. Over the past year much needed work has been done on the boundary walls by Lauro Masonry. Security lights and signs were added. As I am writing this, TJ's Outdoor Maintenance is installing a walking path from the Prospect Entrance to the Columbarium, the part of the cemetery that is still in use. We have had services up there when people with mobility challenges weren't able to approach the columbarium. But we don't want to leave folks out. This path was carefully staked out as not to intrude on those who are resting in peace. It is furnished with pavers. We had originally favored a lesser option, a solid fine gravel path. TJ's was so generous as to offer us the paver upgrade without additional cost. The owner of TJ's, Tim Landmesser, has ties to St. Peter's and in fact his parents purchased a niche in our cemetery years ago. This path will enable people with walkers and wheelchairs to safely approach the site.

Eight historical markers will be added, highlighting some of the pioneers of our town who are buried there. We will also add memorial benches and smaller memorial trees. All of this comes with significant expenses that go well beyond regular maintenance. Therefore, we are kicking off a mini campaign on Sunday, February 12 to raise \$ 15,000 for these cemetery upgrades by Easter of this year (April 9) through one-time special donations. The total costs for our upgrades are between \$ 25,000 and \$ 30,000 but we are using some available funds. The historical markers for instance will be paid from our Memorial Fund.

We encourage people who are making plans for future funeral arrangements to consider our columbarium. The prices for a niche are listed below and they include the plaques that will be added later. A niche can hold up to two small urns.

Finally, you can help us on **Saturday, April 15**. On that day, there will be a cemetery spring clean-up from 9:00 a.m. until 12:00 noon. And stay tuned, because we are planning a special event to celebrate all these upgrades in the month of May.

On **Sunday, February 19**, we will kick off the cemetery mini campaign with a presentation, and lots of information, as well as our newly developed **cemetery brochure**.



A MESSAGE FROM SAM TARASENKO MUSIC MINISTER



The Subtle Art of Organ Improvisation

Improvisation begets composition. It is the foundation of great musicianship because it combines restraint through form with unplanned aleatoric creation. If I lost you with my mumbo jumbo, allow me to explain: improvisation takes a lot of practice to get good at. You can't just fake it. You have to submit to rules of harmony, counterpoint, and form while making it sound entirely spontaneous. At the end of an improvised piece, it has to come together in a seamless and emotionally satisfying way. The coolest thing about improvisation is that it involves the listeners way more than a through composed piece does. You as a listener unwittingly act as a co-creator in the music. If the improviser loses the listeners' attention, that means there is something dishonest in the improvisation. If there is silence you can slice with a knife, the process of creation happened down to the quantum level. Again, this takes discipline and restraint. If the musician has a big ego, their improvisation sounds like showing off. Conversely, a good improviser senses where the listeners are at and invites them on a journey to fathom the music's endless possibilities.

When I improvise around a hymn melody, I try to submit to the text and bring it to life. Bach is my greatest inspiration. His improvisations gave birth to some of the greatest music humanity has heard. When he went to the court of Frederick II of Prussia in 1747—a flutist of great ability—he astounded all the listeners by taking the king's melody (an odd, brooding melody with lots of half steps intentionally written to stump Bach) and turning it into an improvised five-voice fugue. That took equal guts and brains. Of course, Bach was inspired by the great organ tradition of 17th century Germany by


giants like Pachelbel, Bohm, and Buxtehude, the latter of which he traveled hundreds of miles by foot just to hear improvise. When he came back, his improvisations took on a greater form unlike anything done before. Rest assured, people complained. His improvisations did not often go over well with the church authorities and he even found himself imprisoned for his intransigence.

Though I'm not Bach, I look to the past for inspiration. Church music should never be stale. The music within the church here on Earth is a reflection of its highest values. When music bores listeners or discourages active participation, it proves the church lost touch with its inherent message of joy and salvation. In light of the down dressing of church music after the 1960s, particularly after the Second Vatican Council, many organists have resisted church music's simplification through continuing the tradition of improvisation. Over the summer, I had the privilege of hearing various organists play. I was most inspired by the organist at St. Luke's Episcopal Church in Germantown—a mission church with an Anglican liturgy—who used jazz improvisation between hymn verses. The congregation stood through it all and afterwards spoke of the organist with unfeigned ebullience. They ate it up! I thank God that there are people restoring hymn playing to its former glory and pushing congregations to rethink their approach to worship.

I hope to write more articles on this topic. Equally, I hope I didn't sound too esoteric in my writing. Know that as a listener, you are a co-creator. Sometimes, my improvisation won't hit the mark. But, with enough humility and the Holy Ghost's fairy magic, we can collectively create a worship experience mindful of the past, relevant to the present's needs, and unrestrainedly creative in the future.

InterFaith Hospitality Network 2023

June will be here before we know it! St Peter's will once again participate in the InterFaith Hospitality network and partner with area congregations and Family Promise MontCo PA to provide emergency shelter for local families experiencing homelessness. Our Social Ministry team hopes all members of our congregations will consider volunteering or providing support to the families while they are staying with us this year. Opportunities will include:

- ◆ Set-up and clean-up of our spaces in the building for the program.
- ◆ Meal Providers - prepare and drop off meals or share them with the families at church
- ◆ Shopping Helpers - take families to supermarket to pick up basic supplies using donated gift cards
- ◆ Evening Helpers - check in on the families in the evening to ensure they have what they need and that the building is secure
- ◆ Transportation Volunteers - transport families between the Family Promise Day Center in Amber and St. Peter's in the morning or the evening
- ◆ Financial Support - grocery gift cards for the families or funds for fuel to operate the Family Promise van





Holy God, Creator of all that is,




