A MESSAGE FROM PASTOR WAGNER

Dear church,

This is one of the earliest liturgical lines in Judeo-Christian history. It appears in several psalms and prayers in the Bible, often more than once in one psalm. Various Bible translations have tried to find the best translation for the beautiful Hebrew word "Hesed" (¬on), and the NIV came up with "steadfast love." It means ... love in the face of difficulties; love, which is patient, gracious and steadfast (dependable). That's how the Hebrews described the nature of God in their songs and prayers. And I guess, we might as well qualify God's love, for human love is not always gracious, dependable and steadfast. Unfortunately, we witness that every week.

"Oh, give thanks to the Lord, for he is good, for his steadfast love endures forever!"

- Psalm 107.1 (NIV translation)

As we reach the month of June, I am grateful for the miracle of my son's resurrection after we almost lost Samuel in April. I call it a resurrection because that's exactly how it felt to our family. The parallel process between his journey from near-death to full restoration and the stories of Passover, Holy Week, Good Friday and Easter (observed during that same critical week) was simply stunning. I will never forget how we welcomed him back on Palm Sunday when the intubation was taken out in the ICU and we received a first inkling that his brain might be alright and Easter, when he literally stood for the first time. He is receiving some ongoing treatment and PT but will be able to resume college in late summer. Yes, it's a miracle ... and I don't use that word lightly. Fact is, he could have died at various points, and the medical professionals weren't so sure he would make it.

I am grateful for the wonderful support I received during this time from Pastor Mike Carlson, Pastor Dayle Malloy, my staff and the leaders of the congregation. They all gave me permission to turn my attention to my family when we all needed to support one another. Thank you! And thanks for the many cards we received and the

"Pillowcases"

This article appeared in our daily e-newsletter on May 21 and was written by Bernie Heinze in preparation for the intergenerational mission to North Carolina (June 21-28). It gives insight into the ministries of our partner congregation, Grace Lutheran in Boone North Carolina and encourages us to help with their pillowcase initiative.

"Truly I tell you, whatever you did for one of the least of these brothers and sisters of mine, you did for me." Matthew 25:40

This verse from the Parable of the Sheep and the Goats was shared by Jesus during His final week and delivered before the crucifixion on the Mount of Olives just outside the city of Jerusalem overlooking the temple. It is as strong a message of truth today as it was then. In the verse, we hear Jesus calling; allowing us to see His face in those of the abandoned, broken and burdened...and being told that when we help the least of our brothers and sisters, we honor Him and reveal the heartbeat of God.

A heart that doesn't reside only in temples or cathedrals but beats in the slums and barren sand-blown desert of Tanzania, in the refugee camps, the hungry schoolchild, the single mother, those fighting a prolonged illness, and the unhoused veteran here in our own neighborhood. Wherever there is need, Jesus is there - waiting, watching, longing to be loved through our hands. As we prepare our hearts and hands for the upcoming St. Peter's Outreach Team's Mission Trip to Boone, North Carolina at the end of June to help those still repairing their homes and businesses following last Fall's hurricane, we are reminded once again that we are truly "the little church that does big things." Time and again, you have risen with generosity, compassion, and faith to meet the needs of God's children both near and far.

Our mission partners at Grace Lutheran Church in Boone carry out a deeply touching ministry: they take donated pillowcases—yes, simple pillowcases—and transform them into dresses for displaced girls and shorts for the boys in Tanzania. These garments become more than just clothes; they become symbols of caring, identity, and dignity. For many of these children, it is the first time they can wear something made just for them. It's a gesture that says, "You are seen. You are loved. You are valued."

Look at their happy and proud faces. In those faces...you are seeing the face of God. And in the act of giving something as simple as a pillowcase, we live out the Gospel of love in action. This is not just a "charitable" thing to do—this is true discipleship. This is grace sewn into every hem, and hope stitched into every seam.

We humbly ask: if you have any new or gently used pillowcases—perhaps tucked in the back of a closet, forgotten in a linen drawer—would you kindly consider donating them to this mission? Solid colors, fun patterns, child-friendly prints—*all are welcome*. They will become garments of grace, woven with your kindness and delivered with your prayers.

This year, 300 pillowcase dresses have already been made by the Grace Lutheran Church Pillowcase Dress Ministry Team as well as 55 boys' shorts. We will take your donations with us and donate them to the Church in June. Whether you have 1 or 100...we'll take them all. Just look at all the pillowcases covering the pews at Grace Lutheran Church earlier this year in the picture below.

Please place your pillowcases in the **marked box outside of the Sanctuary** anytime between now and June 14th. Your simple gift can help us deliver a message far louder than words: that God's love knows no borders, and neither does the warmth of this church's heart.

Box City

Box City is an event were youth and adults sleep outside in boxes to raise money and awareness of homelessness in Montgomery County. Sadly this year the weather was Code Blue (when the temperature with wind chill is below 32 degrees) and we had to sleep inside. Still in our boxes and still without heat. The 53 youth and adults were able to raise \$3,279, made 74 peanut butter and jelly sandwiches, 14 health kits and 8 no sew blankets to donate. Our Social Ministry team hopes all members of our congregations will consider volunteering or providing support to the families while they are staying with us. Opportunities include:

- Set-up and clean-up of our spaces in the building for the program.
- Meal Providers prepare and drop off meals or share them with the families at church
- Evening Helpers check in on the families in the evening to ensure they have what they need and that the building is secure
- Transportation Volunteers transport families between the Family Promise Day Center in Amber and St. Peter's in the morning or the evening
- Financial Support grocery gift cards for the families or funds for fuel to operate the Family Promise van


Over 50 volunteers provided support for the program last year! If you have any questions about the program or would like to volunteer, please contact Brian Brenfleck or Robin Alderfer.






Thrift Shop

ST. PETER'S COUNCIL CONVERSATIONS

For me, the true start of summer is transitioning to our one service schedule! As an early riser and dedicated "8:30-er," I have to say that the full church experience is wonderful! This past Sunday, June1, was a family service and it was alive with amazing music, a baptism, confirmation stories and our "littlest of littles" participating in the service. From my pew, it looked like a full house!

And this observation takes me to some recent Council discussions. First, as you know, we will continue with the 2-service schedule in the Fall. Even as an early service devotee, I was ready to vote for the 1 later service as I love being in a full church. But we looked at the numbers (the ushers take a count at each service on Sundays), and the 2 services brought more people into church than our 1 service schedule. So, while the early service is somewhat less well attended (ok, A LOT less attended), we are serving the worship needs of more people than the 1 service.

The second Council discussion centered on something that we are calling the church Vitality project. I introduced this to you in the last Steeple Views, but we are now moving ahead with a committee that will engage with the congregation. We felt that having the whole Council working on this project would amount to "too many voices," and that we would be better served by a smaller, dedicated group to begin this process. From last month's Steeple Views: We will be looking at how we can fully engage our youth; ways that we can connect with and serve our North Wales community; and faithfully steward our resources – both monetarily and our own gifts- so that our little church that does big things remains a thriving place of worship and service. I hope we have bold conversations, both within Council and with the congregation. And I hope that you will consider offering your voice. In the coming weeks we will be offering "listening sessions" so that you CAN use your voice. Do you think we need to encourage younger families? Change up the services? Stay with the status quo? Advertise? There are no wrong answers or ideas. But we want to talk with you as opposed to sending yet another survey! Stay tuned!

My last point is a little more serious... as Pastor mentioned at the beginning of the June 1 service, our "giving" is down a bit. Nothing serious, but as we move into the summer months and you are traveling, please consider enrolling in Online Giving or mailing your weekly pledge to the Office. Winter did hit us a little harder this year when it came to plowing and heat, so think of us while you are enjoying your summer fun!

Confirmation Speeches

Our six Confirmation students were asked to select songs that had meaning to them on their Confirmation journey. In this issue we'll highlight Aiden Coover and Lily Shaffer's confirmation speeches and the other speeches will appear in future Steeple Views.

Aiden Coover

Quite the uplifting song! My name is Aidan, and this song, "After The Scripture" by Manchester Orchestra, has really struck a chord with me during my second and final year of confirmation. Knowing the story behind it – how the band was invited to a fan's memorial after she passed away from bone cancer, and how moved they were to write this song about their experience – makes it even more powerful. It highlights how even a simple act of showing up can lead to something deeply meaningful.

For me, the lyrics beautifully capture the confusing and overwhelming nature of grief. The initial lines, "That was a bee sting, a speck in my eye, a casual movement, a thief in the night," resonate with how loss can sometimes feel like a series of small, almost unnoticed moments that suddenly culminate in something huge and painful. Then, the shift to "Now I can't forget you, sword in my side, candle that burned me, delivered me light" speaks to the lasting impact this connection has had. It's like the band members, by witnessing this family's grief, now carry a piece of it with them, a "sword in their side." But the experience, though painful ("burned me"), also brought a new understanding, a "light," to their perspective.

Thinking about this song, two Bible verses come to mind. Romans 5:3, "Not only so, but we also glory in our sufferings, because we know that suffering produces perseverance," offers a sense of hope within the pain. It reminds me that even though losing someone, or even the fear of losing someone, is incredibly difficult, it can ultimately make us stronger. I know this from my own experience. In the later months of last year, I almost lost someone I care about deeply. During that time, I found myself turning to God more than ever, praying constantly for their well-being. Psalm 34:18, "The Lord is near to the brokenhearted and saves those who are crushed in spirit," became a real comfort to me. It was a reminder that even in those moments of deep fear and uncertainty, when it felt like everything was falling apart, God was still there, offering solace and strength. This song and these verses together speak to the journey of grief, the pain it brings, but also the potential for growth and the unwavering presence of God in our lives.





Lily Shaffer

Good morning! My name is Lily. This is my second year in confirmation. I chose You Will Be Found as my song. This song is from the musical, Dear Evan Hansen which is about a high schooler who gets caught in a lie. Evan feels like an outsider after his personal letter is seen by others. This song, "You Will Be Found", is a speech about hope and connection by Evan.

I relate to Evan in the way of being anxious, a worrier, and an over-thinker. I worry about School. About what people think about me. About the future, the unknown ahead of me.

One excerpt that relates to this is Philippians chapter 4 verse 6, "Do not be anxious about anything, but in everything, by prayer and petition, with Thanksgiving, present your request to God." Later in the chapter, verses 8 and 9, "Finally, brothers, whatever is true, whatever is noble, whatever is right, whatever is pure, whatever is lovely, whatever is admirable- if anything is excellent or praiseworthy- think about such things. Whatever you have learned or received or heard from me, or seen in me- put it into practice. And the God of peace will be with you."

I need to lift these worries to God. I need to live every day in the path he has set for me. I know it is all I can do to follow him. I know it is meant for me. But I need to ignite this fire. I need to work to start what God has shown me, the lessons I have learned from him and will hold close to me forever. The lessons that are the staples of my life, the reasons for waking up in the morning. The reasons to be kind to not only the people around me but to myself.

Another verse that speaks to me in relation to this song is Exodus chapter 18 verse 18, "You and these people who come to you will only wear yourselves out. The work is too heavy for you; you cannot handle it alone." In the song the lyrics "when you don't feel strong enough to stand, you can reach, reach out your hand" relate to this excerpt. Both connect the idea of being able to reach out to God in times of darkness or trouble.

Earlier this year my dad had to go to the hospital. He's okay and I knew he would be okay at the time, but in all honesty I was terrified. And when I felt that way, I took a breath and a moment, and I prayed. I prayed for my dad and that he'd be okay. I prayed for my family and made sure that they were feeling okay at the time too. When I didn't know if everything would be okay, I reached my hand out to God. I knew that I wouldn't be able to handle it on my own in the moment. The situation was too heavy for me to handle alone.

This experience brought me closer to my religion as a whole and this song are the words I needed in that moment. The message of the song is clear, but I know for me it goes so much deeper than just on the surface. In hard times like these I need to know I can't handle it alone or I'll wear myself out. I need to know I'm not alone and that I am always able to communicate with God. I need to trust in him.

This song reminds me that I'm not alone in everything and I will always be able to reach out to God. Even when it's pitch dark around me, God will be the light. He will help you to rise from the floor no matter how many times you fall. He will carry you when you do and don't need help. He will always be there, now and forever. Amen.
