A MESSAGE FROM PASTOR WAGNER

Dear church,

This is from one of the best-known parables of the New Testament. It's a story that exemplifies the core of our Lutheran theology, the way we think about God. The son in this story totally messes up, ruins his life, squanders the blessings he had grown up with and comes home broke, - his ego shattered, his clothing in tatters, his future bleak. Even those of us who may be tempted to judge and feel that this young man, who led a "dissolute life," deserves all the disgrace, will be pulled into the gravity field of the father's love. It's that strong. Part of the power of this story is the fact that this father shows no hesitation at all, he has no second thoughts. As soon he sees his son return and hears his broken voice, he initiates an act of healing and grace. Because for-

"The son said to him, 'Father, I have sinned against heaven and before you; I am no longer worthy to be called your son.' But the father said to his slaves, 'Quickly, bring out a robe – the best one – and put it on him."

Luke 15: 21-22

giving someone is an act of healing, often for both sides. Annie Robinett, who was baptized as an adult on Reformation Sunday, spoke about that. She selected a Baptism verse from another forgiveness narrative in the Bible, the story of Joseph (Genesis).

For our spiritual father Martin Luther, recognizing the radical nature of God's love and forgiveness, was a life-changing insight. He was a young man who had been traumatized. I think that's the word we would use today, overused as it may be sometimes. Part of the trauma came from his own troubled relationship with a demanding and sometimes violent father. Part of it may have come from his own sensitivity. Part of it came from the church of his upbringing with its emphasis on human perfection. Luther simply never felt good enough and, as a medieval man, he was afraid of hell. But this is not a story that modern people, with tons of psychology at their disposal, can easily dismiss as a tale from the dark times, back then when people didn't know any better... I know too many people in our world today who don't feel good enough, who can't accept themselves, who feel judged, often by those wicked inner critics, etc. I know one person who has chosen to wear an amulet that says, "I am good

enough." Just as a reminder, you know. Because the soul may forget. The soul may need that reminder: "I am good enough." Sometimes those mantras and messages that we carry with ourselves can be powerful.

Luther was traumatized and did not feel good about himself. It took patience, years of search for an answer and a better understanding of the nature of the gospel until he was able to forgive himself. He carried his own mantra around. Today it sounds a little bit complicated, "We are justified by faith through God's grace." In other words: we are accepted.

Going back to the parable... The moment when the father orders his staff to clothe his son with the best robe is pivotal. It's an order to cover his shame. It's also an expression of the father's unconditional love. And that's exactly how Jesus wanted us to think about God, as a loving father. Ultimately, the Christian gospel is very simple and non-judgmental. What's difficult about it is all about us and our inability to accept it or to forgive ourselves. That part is what took Luther so long. It's what still takes many people years and sometimes decades. You are really forgiven and loved. This is most certainly true.

A MESSAGE FROM SAM TARASENKO MUSIC MINISTER

Dear Friends,

Did you hear the Festival Choir on Reformation Sunday? If not, you missed an extraordinary feast day celebration. The music ministry has been working hard to bring exciting, diverse, and spirit filled music into our worship services. This diversity continues as we enter November and December. You will hear A Common Thread lead services on November 12th and December 3rd. On Christmas, you will hear the Festival Choir again lead the choral Christmas Eve service at 8:30 pm. Between all these events, you'll hear guest musicians make appearances. Be sure to stay tuned for all the exciting things that are happening these next few weeks.

Musical Meanderings

In this installation of **Musical Meanderings**, I ask: what is the role of "reverent" music in worship? Over my time in working at mainstream Protestant churches, I noticed an obvious decline in membership and simultaneous simplification of music. Along with that, words like "king" or "bow" are either deleted or replaced with more accessible language. The sense of awe and grandeur of the traditional liturgy is steadily being replaced with a more inclusive spirit of folk and contemporary sounds in the hopes of making church palatable to newcomers, ex-Catholics, and others.

My original question leads to two others. What is the purpose of worship itself? Is the experience of "reverence" with its monarchical connotations now obsolete? In the spirit of debate, I offer my opinions while suggesting valid contradictions to them. And so, let's explore those questions in reverse.

Reverence: the Catholic church has fundamentally been extremely hierarchical. It carried with it a ponderous sense of authority and mystery. With it came many beautiful works of art and architecture, and brutal executions of mystics and manipulation of the masses through illiteracy and fear. With the printing press came the Reformation and, eventually, a questioning of the church itself. Art declined. So did the number of stake burnings.

FROM THE BELL TOWER



Dear St. Peter's Congregation,

Most people in the Western world are familiar with Beethoven's melody, "Ode to Joy," and church-goers often sing the tuneful hymn based on it, "Joyful, Joyful, We Adore Thee." We at St. Peter's sang this beloved hymn on Reformation Sunday. What people might not realize is that this melody is taken from the fourth and last movement of Beethoven's Symphony #9. While not overtly Christian, the movement is one of Beethoven's crowning achievements; it summons humanity to the highest spiritual calling of reverence to and union with

the Creator God.

Beethoven was a master of passion and drama; he was both mystic and musical jokester, yet the person behind the musical façade often lived a tragic existence, one punctuated by an abusive father, unknown disease and, finally, total deafness. He was rude, egotistical and (by many accounts) slovenly. He was frequently ridiculed for both his personality and his appearance by a society whose acceptance he craved. How could such a wretched being become a messenger for the love of the Almighty God?

The Ninth Symphony was one of Beethoven's final works, written after he descended into total deafness. The fourth/last movement was the first symphonic movement to ever incorporate a chorus. The singers are charged with delivering the message of the "Ode to Joy" poem written by the German poet, Friedrich Schiller. While the first few stanzas of the poem are set to the cheerful, uplifting "Ode to Joy" melody, Beethoven then makes an abrupt pivot for the last stanza of the poem. The music suddenly becomes ethereal; it then draws the listener to one of the most sublime moments in Western music:

Be embraced, all you millions, Share this kiss with all the world! Way above the stars, brothers, There must live a loving Father. Do you kneel down low, you millions? Do you see your maker, world? Search for him above the stars, Above the stars he must be living. Continued: Meanderings

And so, when we sing the hymn "Praise My Soul the King of Heaven," we marvel at the majestic beauty of the words in the same way we watched King Charles' coronation: a relic of the past. Do we declutter in favor of simplicity and inclusivity or do we preserve the past in distant admiration?

Worship: "To honor or show reverence for as a divine being or superpower," according to Webster's Dictionary. And here again, we see the word "reverence." It has a sense of submission and bowing down, which is not necessarily pleasurable in a society where we are taught to bow to no one. For whom is our worship designed? Is it for a God whom we've been taught is omnipotent and sits on a heavenly throne? Or has worship evolved into something new with a more nebulous endpoint?

As an organist, I naturally strive to evoke the majesty in music for which that instrument has been designed. But opinions differ. What is your perspective?

Although a link to a recording isn't available here, the YouTube recording of Beethoven Symphony #9, 4 th movement by the Philharmonia Baroque is recommended for its English translation near the top of the video, with the original German poem near the bottom. To hear the most ethereal part of the movement, scroll to 13:49 and listen to the next 3-1/2 minutes to 17:18.

A caveat: this is not casual listening. Please listen with an attitude of reverence and awe.

CEMETERY CELEBRATION October 15

We were looking toward the sky all weekend long. The weather almost cancelled our long-planned celebration of the cemetery upgrades that were accomplished in 2023. Thanks be to God, it cleared up on Sunday morning, and we were able to flock to the hill where St. Peter's was called into being almost 250 years ago. A group of about 50 people gathered there around noon time for a blessing and acknowledgment of those who contributed to the effort through leadership, financial support, and expert labor to give our cemetery a new look and some important additions.

It was the irony of God that the person who was most involved in the negotiations for the walking path happened to need it on that day due to a recent knee replacement surgery. The beautiful paver walking path was constructed by T.J.'s Outdoor Maintenance in Skippack. Five memorial benches were donated and placed around the columbarium, providing seats for visitors and for attendees of interment services. Four tree memorials were added, and eight new historical markers tell the story of some of the cemetery "residents." It was especially moving to see Lee Heist stand in front of the old gravestone of his ancestor Philipp Heist who donated that plot of land in the 18th century.

If you are interested in a Columbarium niche for a future interment, please contact the church office. We are also open to non-members who live in the North Wales area. And we hope to see you next spring for our big clean-up.

UPDATE FROM UKRAINE

Updates from Pastor Ihor Shemihon and his Lutheran congregation in Ukraine: St. Martin's ELC, Kyiv.

Dear Bernie! Warm greetings from Kyiv. Yes, I read your letter. Thanks for it, there were a lot of interesting details. I am very glad that you have such wonderful events in the fall. This is a good German tradition. We also celebrate; we had the opportunity to have picnics on our site. First for the wards of the House of Mercy, then separately for the church community. We cannot allow the consumption of alcohol for the residents of the House of Mercy, since many of them are alcohol addicts. But for the church there is no problem with this. Today is Reformation Day, so after church we are planning to go to the pub with friends. I heartily congratulate you and the Church of St. Peter on this wonderful holiday!

Now some news.

We were able to move forward with construction a little more on our own. Namely: make a well on the site, now we have drinking water. We also ordered an electricity connection. We expect connection by the end of 2023. I had a meeting with the humanitarian department of the Lutheran World Federation. They are more interested in supporting our work with the homeless. The church, unfortunately, is not so interesting to them. As a result of the meeting, we came to the following agreements. The Federation supports our ministry during the cold season. They do this together with the German charity foundation "Bread for the World". For the House of Mercy, this is significant support that will ensure the stability of the organization until April 2024. Together with my wife, I made a grant application; the project includes renting premises, employee salaries, providing comprehensive assistance to 50 homeless people, as well as partial assistance to 1000 people. In total, we were supported for \$50,000.

We had an additional meeting with Mr. Mark Mullan (head of the VLF humanitarian office) and the bishop of our church. We asked about the possibility of church construction. Mark's answer was: we cannot directly support construction, since this is not within our competence. But there is, hypothetically, such an opportunity: you are reporting on the first joint project with us. If everything is fine, then we will expand our cooperation to construction in 2024. As I understand it, it will be possible to build a church building only in conjunction with the buildings of the House of Mercy. And this will come second. I reported this to the community. We are praying, and we are not yet sure that this is the only possible solution.

We continue to rent premises as a church. And it is already becoming cramped for us. On the one hand, this is a great joy, since God brings new people to the church. Donations have also increased. On the other hand, you already need to think about what to do next. Where to find funds to purchase or at least rent larger premises, as well as construct a building. Bishop Schwartz's opinion on this matter: in the post-Soviet space there are no Lutheran churches that were able to independently build a church building. This has always been done jointly with other churches and private sponsors. You are no exception. The fact that you have land is already very good.

So we trust God and are slowly collecting funds for 2024.

A little about the war. It is a great shame for Ukraine that there are many corrupt officials in our government. In the international arena they are well aware of this. In this regard, assistance to Ukraine on the scale necessary for wartime was suspended. This is already affecting the situation at the front. The Ukrainian army attacks less and less often, and there is more and more talk that it would be good to switch to defense for the winter period. It's Complicated. But the Russians are not going anywhere. You described very well that they cannot be trusted. Negotiations with the Russians are the beginning of the end.

But we don't give up and do what we can. So, the community of St. Martin began making trench candles again. We want to produce 1000 pieces this year. Now we transfer them not only to our friends from special purposes, but also through the general channels of the German Evangelical Lutheran Church of Ukraine. Our bishop collects and buys bandages, tourniquets, and dressings. These bandages save lives because they quickly stop bleeding during injuries. We distribute manufactured candles along with bandages through military doctors.


